Homeowner's Association Annual Meeting 2017 Recap

On November 19, Tower Lakes residents attended the annual homeowner's association meeting at the American Legion Hall in Wauconda. Over 75 residents attended, which qualified a quorum. TLIA President Randy Young kicked off the meeting by thanking those who stepped up to volunteer over the past year. "Be that person who steps up to improve our community." He then called for approval of the 2016 minutes and talked about the state of the association. Specifically, he stated, "We can no longer operate as a "kitchen table" organization." He was referring to our growth over the last several years and our need to operate more as a business in all areas of accounting and financial reporting. His theme this year centered around operating procedures, growth, and a forward-looking approach to operations.



Janet Blake, chair of the Nominations Committee, introduced the candidates running for the 2018 TLIA Board.

President Young then explained the details of the bylaw amendments seeking membership approval:

Amendment #1: Committee name change – The membership voted on changing the name of the Social Committee to the **Events Committee** and on changing the name of the Public Relations Committee to the **Communications Committee**.

Amendment #2: Capital-spending limits – The membership voted on increasing the capital-spending limit. The current bylaws state that the board can spend up to \$5,000 without membership approval on any given project. The board was seeking to raise that limit to \$10,000.

Amendment #3: Check signing limit change – The membership voted on increasing the check-signing limit. The current bylaws state that the treasurer can write a check for up to \$250 without a second signature. The board was seeking to raise this limit to \$500.

Amendment #4: Fiscal year change – The membership voted on changing the current fiscal year (November 1 – October 31) to match the calendar year (January 1 – December 31). The change would eliminate confusion over billing and dues collection. It would also mean members would be invoiced for 2 additional months (November and December 2017) in FY18.

Voting proposition #5: Property swap action – The path to the TLIA boat landing at 703 N. Lake Shore Drive was approved to be swapped with the homeowner's land it bisected allowing for clear access to the boat landing. As it turns out, the Village of Tower Lakes owned that property, not TLIA; so the Village will be vacating the land to TLIA and the membership was asked to accept the vacated land and then complete the original swap with the homeowner.

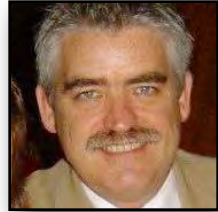

Annual Meeting - continued from page 1.

Linda Kuna, financial secretary, gave the membership an update on the dues collection. The board collected \$272,652 in total revenue last year. That includes RFPP, grant money for the rain garden and other income. ([Click here for the full details. See slide 8.](#)) The outstanding dues for 2017 total almost \$18,000, however, \$12,000 of that is attributed to six households that are several years in arrears. Linda also stated that 23 homes in Tower Lakes sold last year. This number is up from 2016, when 17 houses sold. She also extolled the use of QuickBooks, a financial software system that has been implemented as a part of the financial re-organization implemented over the last three years.

Mary Magro, treasurer, presented the 2018 budget (actual vs. budgeted). The capital balance is over \$72,000. ([See detailed budget by clicking this link. Slide 11.](#))

Bill Hare, chair of the TLIA Audit Committee, explained the audit process. The Committee took two months of financial records from not only the Board but from each committee and audited the books. The committee found we are in good financial shape, but need to keep better records, including the implementation of GAAP (generally accepted accounting principles). He also stated that the tennis courts were required to be categorized as a fixed asset with depreciation over the next 15 years. There were several areas of recommendation for improvement, including timely and accurate monthly statements, ensuring approval of invoices by committee chairs before paying bills, following GAAP, using an outside contractor and CPA for additional financial management.

President Young then talked about the 2018 financial re-organization, including a 12-month vs. 14-month budget. ([See detailed budget by clicking on this link. Slide 18 and 19.](#))

Andy Hay gave an update on the rain garden. Phase One – Bays Park is complete. It cost over \$73,000, but was paid for largely from Illinois EPA grant money and volunteer matches. TLIA and the Village of Tower Lakes split the remaining expenses of \$5,125. Next phase includes maintenance of Bays Park and a rain garden at Wagner Park (east boat landing). Steve Burgoon thanked Andy for his hard work and dedication over the years on this challenging and long-term project.

Volunteers needed on Lake Committee

TLIA LAKE COMMITTEE

The Lake Committee is looking for volunteers to help with, and/or lead, the animal control subcommittee. This is an important role as it helps manage the goose population and keeps an eye out for beaver activity so they can be removed from the lake. Volunteers should expect to go out in the spring looking for geese as they begin to pair up and begin the mating season. Activity would include getting in and out of a boat along the various shorelines looking for nests and then following our DNR permit protocol for oiling the eggs. The more we get, the fewer geese we will have around the lake and the subsequent mess they cause. For the beavers, the lead will work with a wildlife specialist to trap and remove them from the lake. The specialist does the trapping; you would need to communicate with him. Beavers cause serious damage to our shoreline trees and in some cases we have lost trees due to their activity. Both animals need to be managed to maintain and improve our lake and community in general.

Chief's Corner - Coyotes

There has recently been an increase in sightings of coyotes throughout the Village. I would like to warn residents about coyotes. These animals are very active this time of year and pet owners should be careful when letting their pets outside. As an avid dog lover, I would hate to see anyone's pet get hurt or killed by these predators, so please

monitor your pets while they are outside.

A coyote is a medium-sized predator; it is an opportunistic feeder and extraordinarily adaptable to a wide range of habitats. Coyotes thrive in suburban/urban as well as rural areas, and will utilize whatever food is naturally available, including small animals, birds, insects and fruits, as well as artificial sources such as garbage, pet food, birdseed and compost. Residents should take precautions to eliminate any food sources in their yard and neighborhood to avoid creating problems with coyotes. Pet owners are advised to keep cats indoors, and dogs under control during the day and in secured kennels or indoors at night.

Coyotes are typically shy and elusive; however, if observed, avoid the animal and notify the Tower Lakes Police Department by calling 911 or 847-526-3800.

Welcome new and re-elected board members. From top to bottom: Steve Burgoon (Vice President), Fran Steffen (Financial Secretary), John Yancey (Member-at-large) and Kevin Middleditch (Member-at-large).

Committee report highlights:

Beach (Mary Magro) – The Beach Committee hosted swim lessons and competitions over the summer. They also lost a huge asset: the oak tree that provided tons of shade. They had 17 lifeguards and closed the beach several times due to high contamination counts in the water. Mary is looking at more efficient ways to announce beach closings. She is also looking for more volunteers to help with the beach administration.

Communications (Cass Young) – We have great engagement from the community on our newsletters, emails and posters. We need help on our website, including better navigation and keeping content current. Our goals for 2018 include digital storage of board communications.

Events (Mark Osterhues) – The Events Committee hosted five events in 2017, excluding the Chili Cookoff, which was cancelled due to weather.

Grounds (John Yancey) – The community lost several key trees this year, including one on the beach and one on Rest Island. However, six new trees were planted in various parks, including the Gazebo, Rose Park, and other areas. Other completed projects include the path on the west side to the east-west bridge and the paved path near Wagner Park. Clean-up day this year included boat landing cleanup and maintenance. The Stewards of the Park Program could use more volunteers.

Grounds Beautification (Pat Covek) – The Committee has “beautified” many of the parks and common areas over the last 12 months, including planting twenty-four trees and bushes at the tennis courts, which will act as a wind barrier and provide noise reduction to the adjacent neighbors. They planted many flowers and bushes over the past twelve months and are hosting the annual Christmas tree lighting ceremony on November 26.

Lake (Tom Kubala) – The lake went through some tough times this past year because of the February ice out, record rains in July and dry weather in September. The Committee is changing lake treatment providers from Rollins to ILM. The new company will concentrate on three areas in an effort to keep our lake healthy: algae, lilies, and submerged plants (coon tail and bladderwort). The Committee has also created a Shoreline Improvement Protocol.

Member Services (Randall Cross) – The Tower Lakes Directory App is doing well, thanks to Mary Beth Adams, who ensures new residents put their contact information in the system. The survey results from last year indicate that walking is the number one activity for Tower Lakers. 65% of residents are over the age of 51. 70% of respondents said they would volunteer.

Tennis (Pat Covek) – Adult and youth tennis lessons were successful over the summer. Dave DeRita volunteered his time to teach the community pickleball, which was so successful that the committee is considering striping the second court for pickleball.

Youth (Jaclyn Aprati and Paula Ermilio) – The Youth Committee organized ten events over the last year. They are looking for more financial support from the board and the community to help fund their events.

The meeting which began at 4pm, adjourned at 6:15pm having completed the extensive and informative agenda. The Board, through President Randy Young, pledged to continue its aggressive plan for community improvement and financial reforms.

The business of re-organizing for the new fiscal year plan, as approved by the membership, will take some time to put in order. The membership can expect to receive dues invoices for FY18 in early December. The invoice will show details of the 2 months dues (Nov./Dec. 2017) and the Jan.-Dec. 2018 obligations. When the members receive their bills and if they have questions they can contact dues@tlia.org or president@tlia.org with questions. Both Fran Steffen and Randy Young will be on call to answer concerns.

Tower Lakes Leadership – Volunteerism and Respect for Nature

Part 2: Investing in Our Future – Education and Community Efforts

Last month highlighted TL residents who are volunteering in state and regional leadership roles which ultimately benefit conservation and nature in Tower Lakes. This month focuses on volunteer leaders at the greater Barrington Community level including inspiring and educating youth to appreciate nature. Here is a sampling of how Tower Lakers are making a big difference for both today and the future.

School Nature Ladies – These certified volunteers present structured, supplemental, hands-on environmental education to K – 2nd graders. Instruction includes indoor sessions and outdoor field trips to learn about local wildlife and plants throughout the year. This has been a highly successful program for over 40 years. Thanks to Christine Lunt who is North Barrington’s current Nature Lady. Sincere thanks also to Michele Gillett and Karen Yancey for years of service and inspiring many youth who are now in college or have children of their own.

School Bird Lady – Michelle Gillett created and continues to contribute in an additional role which focuses on teaching children about the birds in their neighborhoods. She started the program 17 years ago for kindergarteners in the Spanish Dual Language program, periodically adding a new grade through 5th grade. Michelle has inspired youth to learn about the natural wonders all around them.

Adult, Young Adult, and Youth Education – There are too many specific examples to list them all here. But residents like Anne Hay, Steve Barten, Patty Barten, Steve Burgoon, Sarah Voska and others regularly share their time and knowledge at the greater Barrington level to benefit others. Examples include leading formal nature based classes for pre-K through adult levels; nature based summer camps; scout project guidance and badge achievement; civic group presentations; facilitating public educational displays; and creation of hands-on nature experiences.

3rd Graders on the Prairie – This internationally recognized program uses nature to teach S.T.E.M. and other citizen scientist skills. Every 3rd grader in D220 participates in a field trip with structured scientific observation and documentation activities which utilize area prairies and are facilitated by volunteers. Over 10,000 students have participated in this learning experience which is a collaborative effort between D220 and Citizens for Conservation. Tower Lakers Linda Kuna, Christine Lunt, Michelle Gillett, Sarah Voska, and Patty Barten have been volunteering for multiple years.

Barrington Area Conservation Trust (BACT) – This is a local conservation NFP chartered in 2001 which has preserved 500 acres and 20 land easements. It provides resident native landscaping consultation; and adult, school and civic group education. Andy Hay collaborated with BACT for TL’s rain garden projects and home certifications. Ann Hay leads their youth education and scout support activities. Mel Ott and Kathy Paczynski are also volunteers.

Citizens for Conservation (CFC) – This is a local, all-volunteer, conservation NFP chartered in 1971 which owns and manages 12 preserves, and has influenced preservation of over 3,500 acres of local lands. It maintains a native seed bank; sources native plants for residents; provides resident native landscaping consultation; educates pre-K through adult and civic groups; and initiated a collaborative network of conservation organizations. Steve Barten, Mel Ott, Kathy Paczynski, and Sarah Voska are volunteers; Patty Barten volunteers on the Board of Directors.



Barrington Area Council of Governments (BACOG) – Part of the mission, of this coalition of Barrington area village governments, is to protect access to a clean sustainable water supply for our region. It provides mapping of aquifers and water recharge areas, and also maintains attention to protective practices and water quality testing. It conducts research into the region’s long-term water supply. Kathleen Leitner, while Village President, was the key BACOG representative in forming the Northwest Water Planning Alliance. The NWPA involved ten organizations representing over 70 communities to collaboratively plan for shared groundwater resources. Dave Parro, current

Young Resident receives Davidson Fellowship

Pranav Sivakumar, 17, of Tower Lakes was recently named a 2017 Davidson Fellow for his research on "almost dark galaxies".

The Davidson Institute is a Nevada-based foundation whose mission is "to recognize, nurture, and support profoundly intelligent young people".

Each year, the Institute awards scholarships to 20 students under the age of 18 who have distinguished themselves in the field of Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics, Literature, Music, or Philosophy. The scholarship is one of "7 Prestigious Undergrad Scholarships" listed by U.S. News & World Report.

Pranav was recognized by the Davidson Institute for his project, "*Searches for Almost Dark Galaxies in Blank Sky Fields with the Sloan Digital Sky Survey.*" Physicists have theorized

that the universe is expanding at an increasingly faster pace.

Clues to this expansion may

come from a better understanding of "dark matter" and "dark energy". Astrophysicists are working to discover almost dark galaxies (ADGs) because they are hypothesized to be dominated by dark matter.

As part of his project, Pranav developed two novel approaches to identify ADGs from data collected by the Sloan Digital Sky Survey. This survey uses a dedicated 2.5-meter telescope to map a quarter of the skies viewable from the northern hemisphere. Pranav's algorithms identified two known ADGs (Leo P and AGC 198691) and discovered other ADG candidates. This discovery could give us new insights into the nature of dark matter. Pranav was mentored on this project by Professor Emeritus Dr. Don York of the University of Chicago.

You may remember Pranav from his 2nd place finish in the 2013 Scripps National Spelling Bee. In 2015, he became the first person to be named a repeat finalist in the Google Science Fair. He received the Virgin Galactic Pioneer Award that year and was recognized by President Obama during White House Astronomy Night.

Pranav is currently a freshman at the University of California, Berkeley, majoring in Astrophysics. In his spare time, he likes to compose music and participate in quiz bowl tournaments. If you see Pranav around the neighborhood, be sure to ask him about his research!

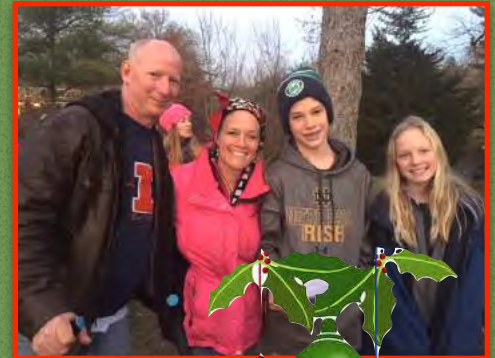
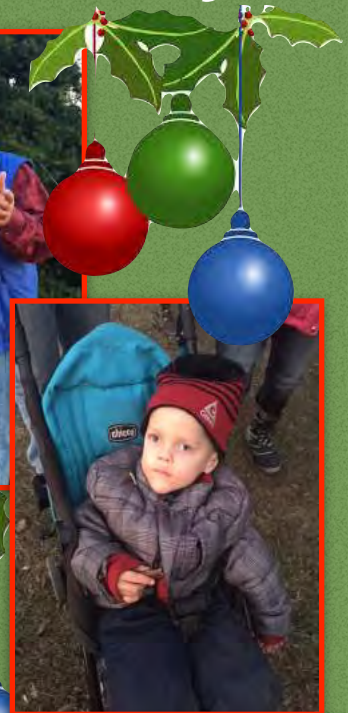
